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

# Voci Singers and Guest Artists

## ~Voci Leadership~

The 2007-08 season is **Jude Navari's** ninth year as Artistic Director of Voci. He has prepared choruses and conducted performances for Berkeley Opera. arranged folk music and coached rehearsals for Westwind International Folk Ensemble's chorus Westwind Voices, conducted premieres of new works by U.C. Berkeley graduate student composers for the Berkeley New Music Project, and served as Artistic Director of the Sacramento Men's Chorus. In August 2001, Jude prepared the vocal ensemble for the West Coast Premiere of Philip Glass's "The Photographer" at the Cabrillo Music Festival. In addition to Voci, he currently conducts the Skyline College Concert Choir. Jude received his Ph.D. in Music Composition from the University of California, Berkeley, where he also studied conducting with Marika Kuzma and Jung Ho Pak.

Assistant Conductor Edna Huelsenbeck is the founder and former director of the Pacific Women's Chorus in San Diego, and Concentus Women's Chorus in Rochester, NY. She previously served as Interim Director for the University Section Club Chorus at U.C. Berkeley, and the Interim Assistant Director of the San Diego Master Chorale. Edna received her Master of Music degree from The University of Texas at Austin, where she studied conducting with Morris Beachy and Craig Hella Johnson. This is her first season with Voci.

Accompanist Heather Heise studied classical piano at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and earned her M.F.A. from Mills College. She has performed and presented original works in New York and Mexico; at Princeton and Stanford Universities; and at Old First Church, Theatre Artaud, and The Marsh in San Francisco. In February 2008, her sound design for Paufve Dance was heard in seven performances at the UC Davis Mondavi Center.

## ~Guest Artists: The Jupiter String Quartet~

The Jupiter String Quartet was co-founded by Michael Jones and Steve **Levintow** in 1997. The quartet performs classical string quartet repertoire throughout the Bay Area several times a year.

Victor Romasevich (first violin) was born in Minsk, Belarus, and as a youth studied with Rostislav Dubinsky of the famed Borodin Quartet. He continued his training at the Moscow Conservatory and, following his emigration to the United States in 1977, at Juilliard with Ivan Galamian. In 1979 he became a violin and viola pupil of the composer and philosopher Iosif Andriasov. Winner of the Gina Bachauer Prize at the 1985 J.S. Bach International Competition, Mr. Romasevich joined the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra as Associate Principal Violist in 1990 and in 1992 moved to the First Violin section. He joined the Jupiter Quartet in 2002.

When Haydn died in 1806, his reputation was as a composer of sacred music. This was the backbone of his art, spanning his whole life. Although posterity recognizes his older brother Joseph as the stronger talent, it was not always so. When Michael succeeded his older brother as treble soloist in the choir of St. Stephen's, it was generally agreed that he had the better voice. And when their voices changed, Michael was the first to secure a permanent post as Kapellmeister to the Bishop of Grosswardein in Hungary. Michael Haydn wrote operas, symphonies, concertos, string quartets and dance music. But he always showed a strong preference for liturgical music, leaving 24 masses, two requiems and 200 other pieces when he died.

The Missa sub titulo Sancti Leopoldi (Mass in Honor of Saint Leopold) was written for the feast of the Holy Innocents Day, December 28th, a favorite occasion of Haydn's, for which he wrote numerous pieces to be sung by the boy's choir of St. Peters. Haydn's setting of the Mass Ordinary is performed interspersed with three of the Mass Propers for Holy Innocents Day - Introit: Ex ore, Gradual: Laudate pueri, and Offertory: Anima nostra. The first two are the Gregorian Chant settings from the Middle Ages; the Gradual: Laudate pueri is Michael Haydn's setting.

#### Marianna von Martines (1744-1812)

The large Viennese household of the Martines family included the great librettist and musician "Metastasio," who was responsible for Martines' education, as well as the young Joseph Haydn, consigned to a wretched (by all accounts) garret, who taught her the harpsichord. Nicolas Porpora instructed her in singing and composition. Martines and her sister played and sang at their home for many local musicians. Martines was made a member of the Musical Academy of Bologna, and her works, including two oratorios, were both performed and published. Her psalm cantata *In exita Isrl* is set to an Italian translation by Metastasio; today's "Deh! cosi ognor" is no. 7 of this work. "Virgam virtutis tuae" is part of her larger work *Dixit dominus*.

## Lucrezia Orsina Vizzana (1590–1662)

Lucrezia Orsina Vizzana was an Italian singer, organist, and composer. Vizzana entered a Bolognese convent at the age of 8, where she was tutored by her aunt, the convent organist, and Vernizzi, the music master. Unusually for her time, she published a work of 20 motets (Componimenti Musicali) in 1623 - and nothing subsequently. "Domine Dominus" is no. 17 of these motets, and demonstrates her early Baroque style, the so-called seconda pratica, with freer use of dissonance and counterpoint.



### Johann Adolph Hasse (1699-1783)

Johann Adoph Hasse was born near Hamburg and there began his career as an operatic tenor. By the age of 22 he had composed his first opera, *Antioco*, in the fashionable Italian style. In fact, he soon moved to Naples to study under Porpora and Scarlatti. A commissioned serenade for two voices, sung at a wealthy merchant's family celebration by two of Italy's greatest singers, Farinelli and Vittoria Tesi, marked the beginning of Hasse's fame and huge popularity. Indeed, Farinelli is said to have lulled Philip V of Spain each evening for 10 years with the same two Hasse airs.

In 1730 Hasse married the celebrated opera singer Faustina Bordoni, and proceeded to Dresden at the behest of Augustus II. Years of travel throughout Europe followed, his numerous operas receiving wild acclaim. In 1739 he and his wife returned to Dresden, where they retired in 1763 from court service, with considerable pensions. Not resting on his laurels, however, Hasse moved to Vienna and continued composing operas. His last, *Ruggiero*, was written for the wedding of the Archduke Ferdinand of Milan. At that occasion a work by the 14-year-old Mozart was also performed, and Hasse observed, "this youngster will surpass us all."

Most of Hasse's manuscripts were burned in the siege of Dresden by the Prussians in 1760; however, some autograph scores are in the libraries of Dresden and Vienna, and contemporary copies of many others remain. This composer, so beloved in his time and so prolific, is almost unknown today. Hasse wrote his Miserere in D minor for the Venetian girls' orphanage "Ospedale degl 'Incurabili," which through its outstanding music instruction and distinguished music directors enabled the female students to contribute to the cost of their expenses by performing concerts for paying audiences. The singing of sacred music and the performance of concerts at Venetian orphanages were then on a level unrivalled, even in Italy. The Miserere Voci sings for you this afternoon demonstrates his beautiful melodic line and harmony, as well as his operatic flair for the dramatic.

### Johann Michael Havdn (1737-1806)

A younger brother of Joseph Haydn, Johann Michael Haydn was born in Rohrau, Austria, and died in Salzburg, where he spent the majority of his life as head of music at St. Peter's Abby. At age 8 he entered the choir of the Cathedral of St. Stephen in Vienna, where his brother Joseph had been active as a soprano soloist. There he learned violin and clavier and taught himself composition by studying Fux's *Gradus ad Parnassum*. In 1763 he became Konzertmeister to Archbishop Schrattenbach in Salzburg and later married a singer in the court chapel. Beginning in 1787 he was violin instructor for the court (succeeding Leopold Mozart), and he was Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's successor as court and cathedral organist, a position which he kept for the rest of his life.

# Composers and Arrangers

### Chiara Margarita Cozzolani (1602-1677)

Chiara Margarita Cozzolani came from a wealthy Milanese family and spent her adult life as a Benedictine nun within the walls of the convent of Santa Radegonda. The nuns of Santa Radegonda were particularly renowned for their music, and Cozzolani was one of their most accomplished singers and composers.

A contemporary of Cozzolani's, Filippo Picinelli wrote: "The nuns of Santa Radegonda of Milan are gifted with such rare and exquisite talents in music that they are acknowledged to be the best singers of Italy. They wear the Cassinese habits of the order of St. Benedict, but under their black garb they seem to any listener to be ...melodious swans, who fill hearts with wonder, and rapture tongues in their praise. Among these sisters, Cozzolani merits the highest praise."

In her later life, Cozzolani served as prioress and abbess at Santa Radegonda and was influential in guiding her convent through difficult times when she fought against the Archbishop who wanted to limit the nuns' practice of music and their contact with the outside world. Although her works were originally published between 1640 and 1650, it is only recently that she has begun to gain recognition as one of the most talented composers of her era.
